Faith Bible Study Guide For the Week of September 7, 2025 Thirteenth Sunday after Pentecost "Clay in the Fire: Shaped Costly for Love"



<u>Be still [2 Minutes]:</u> As you hear these Centering Words, let us greet each other, greet the Holy Spirit, and begin with 1 minute of silence, breathing in the breath of God and allow the group to open themselves to the Holy Spirit today:

CENTERING WORDS: God knows us better than anyone and loves us more deeply than we can fathom. Even when we become less than God created us to be, God continues to love us and have faith in us.

OPENING PRAYER: Creator God, you have crafted us in your image and created us for greatness, as we share your love, justice, and compassion. Help us to live into this creation. Strengthen us, as we seek to answer your call. When we go astray, guide us back to your ways. When we fall apart, put us back together again. When we shrink in fear, lift our heads, that we may come to see your love and grace guiding us home. Amen.

Be the Word:

Old Testament Lesson: Jeremiah 18:1-11

Jeremiah received the Lord's word: 2 Go down to the potter's house, and I'll give you instructions about what to do there. 3 So I went down to the potter's house; he was working on the potter's wheel. 4 But the piece he was making was flawed while still in his hands, so the potter started on another, as seemed best to him. 5 Then the Lord's word came to me: 6 House of Israel, can't I deal with you like this potter, declares the Lord? Like clay in the potter's hand, so are you in mine, house of Israel! 7 At any time I may announce that I will dig up, pull down, and destroy a nation or kingdom; 8 but if that nation I warned turns from its evil, then I'll relent and not carry out the harm I intended for it. 9 At the same time, I may announce that I will build and plant a nation or kingdom; 10 but if that nation displeases and disobeys me, then I'll relent and not carry out the good I intended for it. 11 Now say to the people of Judah and those living in Jerusalem: This is what the Lord says: I am a potter preparing a disaster for you; I'm working out a plan against you. So each one of you, turn from your evil ways; reform your ways and your actions.

New Testament Lesson: Luke 14:25-33

Large crowds were traveling with Jesus. Turning to them, he said, **26** "Whoever comes to me and doesn't hate father and mother, spouse and children, and brothers and sisters—yes, even one's own life—cannot be my disciple. **27** Whoever doesn't carry their own cross and follow me cannot be my disciple.

28 "If one of you wanted to build a tower, wouldn't you first sit down and calculate the cost, to determine whether you have enough money to complete it? 29 Otherwise, when you have laid the foundation but couldn't finish the tower, all who see it will begin to belittle you. 30 They will say, 'Here's the person who

began construction and couldn't complete it!' **31** Or what king would go to war against another king without first sitting down to consider whether his ten thousand soldiers could go up against the twenty thousand coming against him? **32** And if he didn't think he could win, he would send a representative to discuss terms of peace while his enemy was still a long way off. **33** In the same way, none of you who are unwilling to give up all of your possessions can be my disciple.

P: Thanks be to God.

Be present: [Being mindful of others and sharing time]

- 1. Take a deep breath. How is it with your soul?
- 2. Where did you feel God's presence most clearly this week?
- 3. Where did you feel God's absence or silence?
- 4. If your life this week were a piece of clay, what stage would it be in: soft and being shaped, drying, in the fire, cracked, or strengthened?
- 5. What do you need from God, or from community, to be "well with your soul" this week?

Be rooted: [Bible Study]

Some Exegesis Notes on the Scriptures:

Jeremiah 18:1-11

- Historical Context: Jeremiah was called as a prophet during a time of national upheaval.
 Judah was under threat from Babylon. The people were turning away from God, and
 Jeremiah had the hard job of calling them back.
- Potter & Clay Image: In the Ancient Near East, pottery was essential for daily life fragile, breakable, but also repairable. The image shows God as both artist and patient worker.
- Key Point: God does not discard marred clay God reshapes. But fire is essential: the kiln transforms soft clay into something durable. Without it, it can't hold water (life).
- Message: Judgment isn't the end it's part of reshaping. Hope and possibility remain when we return to God.

Luke 14:25-33

- Context: Jesus is addressing "large crowds" who are following him. He wants them to understand the seriousness of discipleship.
- Hard Sayings: "Hate father and mother..." is hyperbole (a Jewish rhetorical device). It emphasizes that discipleship requires ultimate loyalty to God, even above family and possessions.
- Cost of Discipleship: Jesus uses practical metaphors building a tower, going to war to show that following him is not casual but deliberate, sacrificial, and costly.
- Connection to Jeremiah: Just as clay must pass through fire to be useful, disciples must pass through sacrifice to be truly formed.
- 1. What image or story from this week's sermon resonates most with you today?
 - Recap: In the sermon we heard about clay on the potter's wheel, Lahaina's fires, Pastor John's faithful presence, and mission as the kiln. Each image points to how God works through brokenness, fire, and costly love.
 - Which one sticks with you most right now, and why?

- 2. Which Scripture spoke to you more this week?
 - Jeremiah 18:1–11 shows God as the patient Potter, reshaping marred clay into something new — God does not discard us.
 - Luke 14:25–33 gives us Jesus' stark words: discipleship costs something; it asks us to carry the cross and reorder our priorities.
 - Which of these spoke most deeply to you this week the tender shaping of Jeremiah, or the convicting challenge of Luke?
- 3. How does the image of clay in God's hands challenge or comfort you?
 - Recap: In the sermon we remembered that clay is fragile when it leaves the wheel. It only becomes durable through fire.
 - Does that truth comfort you knowing God is always shaping? Or challenge you — knowing fire (testing, sacrifice) is necessary to be useful?
- 4. Where do you see God reshaping you personally, or our church, in this season?
 - Just as Lahaina is slowly rebuilding out of ashes, and Pastor John remains with his people through the long, costly work, where do you notice God reshaping your own life or our church community right now?
- 5. Jesus says to "count the cost" of discipleship. What costs have you experienced in your own walk of faith? What costs do you resist?
 - Jesus' examples building a tower, going to war remind us that discipleship isn't casual, it's deliberate and costly. In the sermon, we remembered that mission costs our time, our money, and our comfort — but it also produces resilience and hope.
 - Where have you felt the cost?
 - Where do you struggle to let go?
- Mission as "the kiln" in what ways have acts of service, giving, or prayer reshaped your faith?
 - Recap: In the sermon we named MISSION not as an "extra" of the church, but as the very kiln that fires and strengthens us. Fundraising, friend-raising, stewardship, showing up, praying, traveling, and serving — all of these are costly but also transformative.
 - How has mission or prayer shaped your faith into something stronger, more resilient, or more useful?

Be transformed: [Faith in Action Challenge]:

- 1. **Personal**: Identify one place in your life where you are resisting God's shaping. Pray this week to soften and yield like clay in God's hands.
- 2. **Community**: Think of one costly but faithful step you can take whether giving, serving, or showing up that strengthens our church to be a vessel of God's love.
- 3. **Global/Missional**: Consider how we can continue to walk alongside communities like Lahaina. Could you write a prayer, letter, or make a gift this week as an act of solidarity?
- 4. **Daily Practice**: Each morning, hold your hands open and pray: "God, shape me as your vessel today. Even if it costs, may I carry your love."
